Connecting Epiphany to Lent


Last month, I suggested that Epiphany is a space for recognition created by Jesus shining a light into our darkness. Furthermore, I mentioned that sometimes we would not welcome or even recognize it. Why might we not welcome it, especially if the light came from Jesus?

Jesus is calling each of us to change our attitudes about God, about others, and about ourselves. By its nature, change is difficult. It entails a restructuring of what is familiar to us. Moreover, the extent of this change directly affects its degree of difficulty. That is, sometimes change requires merely a "repositioning" of the elements of what is already familiar to us. For example, when you open your sock drawer, you may decide to rearrange its contents so that items used more frequently are at the front. Such rearrangements are indeed changes; but since they don't introduce any new elements, they do not disturb conscious awareness.

At other times, change requires the introduction of "new" items among the already familiar ones. An example of this might be rearrangement of a song by changing its rhythm (or time signature). For instance, if it's not already one, try changing your favorite church hymn into a waltz. Actually, the elements involved in this change are not new. Rather, the "newness" consists in the way these elements are applied.

On other occasions, change involves the introduction of genuinely new elements into our consciousness. These types of changes confound our understanding. They often appear in the form of conflicting opposites, such as "the suffering servant." Jesus embodied one of these. Changes of this magnitude require time simply to understand the newness – let alone how to respond to it.

The season of Lent offers us such a period of time. What we do with this period of time is essentially our Lenten journey. We refer to it as a "journey" because of the difficulty involved both in understanding what happened to Jesus and why, along with what's happening to us and why. Most significantly, Lent gives us a space to ponder, to prepare for, and to make the changes which Jesus' presence with and ministry to us requires of us.

The Golden Spruce, A True Story of Myth, Madness, and Grace

By John Valliant, Originally published in 2005.

This is a book about so many things—the natural history of British Columbia and the off-shore islands; the heritage of the Haida and other island British Columbian tribes; the lives of the courageous men who felled trees for logging companies in the 1900's; and the life of logger-turned-activist Grant Hadwin, who felled a magnificent and one-of-a-kind tree.

Valliant weaves a compelling tale of the formation of the islands and the native tribes, who first gained wealth trading sea otter pelts with the Europeans. When that business dried up, there were tough times until the logging business picked up. One tree, the Golden Spruce of myth and legend, was spared by the logging conglomerates as a publicity stunt, until Hayden came along.

The Yachats Library does not have a copy. It is available through Amazon—Kindle for \$8.47, used \$.01, new \$8.95.
