Who Is Jesus? What a Difference a Lens Makes is by Judy Yates Siker. Each of the study's nine lessons explores the question "Who is Jesus?" through a particular theological lens. Dr. Siker explores the answers to the question through the lenses of Mark, Matthew, Luke, John, Paul, Hebrews, the non-canonical gospels, the Abrahamic Faiths, and contemporary cultural interpretations. She notes that each of us who reads the New Testament is an interpreter of the text, and that how we interpret it depends in part on who we are.

Living the Questions, Every Wednesday at 6:00 p.m.

A new weekly study, *Living the Questions*, begins Wednesday, October 12, at 6:00 p.m.

Living the Questions does not seek to provide easy answers but rather to be a resource for people who are in the midst of a lifelong conversation about the mysteries of faith and life.

Living the Questions is for those on a journey of faith discovery and, perhaps, those who have given up on traditionalist church teaching. *Living the Questions* seeks to provide the groundwork for a credible Christian faith for the 21st Century.

Biblical literalism and blind allegiance to ancient creeds and traditions can make it difficult for many people to continue believing. *Living the Questions* asks us to consider the hard questions that lead to a faith that is our own.

While *Living the Questions* does not provide pat answers to pressing questions about God and faith, it does more than just ask questions. In conversation with a wide variety of biblical scholars, theologians and other scholars in the field of religion, *Living the Questions* offers participants a broader context in which to formulate their own answers.

YCPC is a congregation that has professed that we take the Bible seriously. One of the reasons we can take it seriously is because we need not take it literally. We find more grace in our search for meaning than we do in absolute certainty . . . more in the questions, than in the answers.

Won't you join us Wednesday evenings as we begin to wrestle with the questions of what it means to be a follower of Jesus? Perhaps together we can begin to live into the most important question of all: If we are called to imitate Jesus . . . what does that really look like?

Living the Questions will be held every Wednesday evening throughout the church year. It begins on Wednesday, October 12, at 6:00pm.

Red Cross Blood Drive

A Red Cross blood drive was held at the church on August 24. Following is part of the Red Cross thank-you letter to YCPC, detailing what was accomplished:

"Our goal for the drive was **28** units and **35** potential donors <u>signed up</u>. Out of the **43** donors who presented, 6 donors were deferred and 13 people gave for the first time. **Thirty Eight (38) pints were given** – well over our goal. The Job Corps joined in and that certainly boosted the numbers. Up to 3 people may be helped from one pint of donated blood. So we potentially helped **114** people."

After thanking the church for providing an excellent space (they may be back once a year) the letter ended stating, "despite all the advances of modern medicine, without life-giving blood many people would not survive. My personal thanks to all who helped as well as those who gave."

Flickers from the Flame - Where God Comes In

Living your faith depends first of all on your definition of faith. The New Testament Book of Hebrews defines faith as "being sure of what we hope for, or certain of what we do not see." (11:1). Focusing on the first half of this statement, faith depends first on what you are hoping for, and secondly on how sure you are of it.

Life on earth depends on the existence of a highly specialized and particular set of circumstances, such as the containment of life-support systems, and the ability of those systems, as well as their containers, to function. As far as I can tell, all of these systems, though renewable, are finite or perishable. Thus, when we have faith in earthly things, we are essentially saying that we trust that they will function according to (or at least grow into) the capability for which they were designed. Notice that we have not mentioned (although it is implied) that they will do so before they perish. For instance, we may have faith that an animal will act in a certain way, that a child will become a reasonable adult, or that adults will accomplish certain things that contribute to the advancement (or at least maintenance) of society as we know it.


But, given the perishability of earthly things as well as the complexities of the human soul, it won't be long before we are wondering about what we can hope for that transcends our finiteness. For instance, we may hope that the love we have for each other never ends, or that the causes we fought for during our time on earth will somehow flourish or continue to be relevant long after our time on earth is complete.

Taking this to a deeper level, we may be wondering about who we can relate to that will outlive us. The first people we may think of are our children, nieces, and nephews. But even though the probability may be substantial that they will still be alive after our time on earth disappears, their lives—like ours—are finite. So we begin to wonder about relating to someone who will be with us no matter where we are, no matter what we are doing, or no matter what happens to us. Now we're talking about *Who we are hoping will be with us*. And that's where God comes in.

Book Group, Friday, October 21, 10:30 a.m.

The Book Group invites all of you to join us on Friday, October 21, at 10:30 a.m., in the McGuire Room at the church. This month the Book Group will be reading two different authors, with very different voices!

We decided to read someone from the past—Zane Grey, who was best known for his popular adventure novels and stories associated with the Western genre in literature and the arts. Grey idealized the American frontier. *Riders of the Purple Sage* (1912) was his best-selling book. In addition to the commercial success of his printed works, they had second lives and continuing influence when adapted as films and television productions. His novels and short stories have been adapted into 112 films, two television episodes, and a television series, *Dick Powell's Zane Grey Theater*. You can pick any of his stories, and he wrote many, many in his career.





The second author is Janet Wallach. We will read her book *Desert Queen*, a biography of Gertrude Bell, who travelled the world in the latter part of 1800 and the early 1900's. She became fascinated with and wrote books about all things Arabian. In this incident-packed biography, Janet Wallach reveals a woman whose achievements and independent spirit were especially remarkable for her times, and who brought the same passion and intensity to her explorations as she did to her rich romantic life. She was an adviser to kings and an ally of Lawrence of Arabia. Too-long eclipsed by Lawrence's fame, Gertrude Bell emerges in this first major biography as a woman whose accomplishments rank as crucial to world history (especially in light of the continuing geopolitical importance of the Middle East) and whose life was a grand adventure.
