For the month of February, the Book Group is reading "Beneath a Scarlet Sky," by Mark Sullivan. This is a triumphant, epic tale of one young man's incredible courage and resilience during World War II and is based on a true story.

Pino Lella wants nothing to do with the war or the Nazis. He's a normal Italian teenager—obsessed with music, food, and girls. When his family home in Milan is destroyed by Allied bombs, Pino joins an underground railroad helping Jews escape over the Alps.

In an attempt to protect him, Pino's parents force him to enlist as a German soldier—a move they think will keep him out of combat. But after Pino is injured, he is recruited at the tender age of eighteen to become the personal driver for Adolf Hitler's left hand in Italy, General Hans Leyers, one of the Third Reich's most mysterious and powerful commanders.

The Book Group will meet on February 16 at 10:30, in the McGuire Room or at the table in the sanctuary. We are a group of people who love to read and not a "club"—we pay no dues and monthly attendance is not required. We read a variety of genres over the year. FLICKERS FROM THE FLAME



What the Light Reveals

Epiphany is all about revelation. Each of us has had experiences (those "ah ha!'s") which are essentially moments of insight—times when we gain clarity about what a situation or circumstance is or means. These moments may occur after a long period of darkness or turmoil, or in a relative instant, perhaps without much (if any) reflection. Regardless of the length of the period of reflection, we call such moments "epiphanies."

We associate "epiphany" with light. Sometimes we actually attribute any given epiphany to light shining in our darkness. That is, we say, "Because of the light, I see what's going on." At other times, we claim that the epiphany is the light itself. That is, we say that "we see the light." Let's consider four examples; the first two of these involve physical light, while the last two involve a different kind of light.

First of all, suppose you are outside at night with neither street lights nor car lights. However, the moon is full, and there are no clouds in the sky. The only sources of light are the moon and stars. In this case, the light is natural, and any progress you make is due to this physical light making your path visible in an otherwise dark world. This is how the wise people found Jesus in Bethlehem (Matthew 2:9).

Secondly, say you're trying to find something in a dark room in your home at night or in the morning before dawn. Before you turn on a light switch, your search is challenging, even if everything in that room is in a position familiar to you. But once you turn on that switch, you quickly find what you seek. In this case, the light is artificial, but it still enables you to find what you're looking for.

Thirdly, suppose you are going about your day, thinking about something someone said to you in some past circumstance. All of a sudden, something clicks within you, and you gain new understanding. In this case, the light is psychological (or spiritual) and the reflection is conscious and/or subconscious.

Finally, suppose you are dreaming and that when you wake up, you not only remember your dream, but also begin to reflect on it and its meaning. In this case, the light is again psychological (or spiritual), but the reflection is a mixture of unconscious and conscious. This is essentially what happened to the wise people after finding Jesus, and why they returned home by a different route (Matthew 2:12).

In each of these four examples (as well as of epiphany in general), light is critical because it enables revelation to occur. But more important even than the light is what the light reveals. That is, what we recognize is more important than how we recognize it.
